

NATIONAL PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Brothers in Alpha Phi Omega:

Greetings and Welcome to the beginning of the fifth decade of Leadership, Friendship, and Service in the greatest Service organization on college campuses. May it always remain so through the efforts of brothers like yourselves.

Frank Reed Horton founded the first chapter forty years ago, with fourteen undergraduates. We are now approaching 400 chapters, due to the endorsement and invitation of university administrators and faculty that Alpha Phi Omega be a part of their campuses.

Why have they done so? The reasons are sound, tried and proven. You and I have experienced them, as have nearly 100,000 college men. Fundamentally, they are:

Service—the primary purpose of Alpha Phi Omega

Experience in Scouting prior to active membership

Availability to all men on campus desiring to render Service

Admission to membership without the use of the blackball system

A national fraternal organization that tolerates no hazing and has no fraternity houses, yet fosters lasting Fellowship

An inclusive organization, open to social fraternity men, though not a social fraternity, and to men of varying interests across campus

The reason we are, where we are, is that brothers like yourselves have maintained these principles. On behalf of the National Fraternity, I thank you for all you are doing, and suggest as a Service challenge for the next two years, this thought from the Denver Convention:

ON OUR COVER —

Dr. Tom T. Galt, Alpha Phi Omega's eighth National President, is Chairman of the Department of Anesthesiology at the Spartanburg, South Carolina, General Hospital. He entered Alpha Phi Omega October 13, 1948, in Delta Kappa Chapter, Emory University. Later, he became a charter member of Kappa Tau, The Citadel, and served as a Presidential Representative, Sectional Chairman, member of the National Executive Board, and National Third Vice President.

In Scouting, he was active in all three programs, advancing to Eagle rank, and earning the Explorer Silver Award. His Scout leadership record includes service as a troop committeeman, Scoutmaster, Explorer Advisor, Council Field Commissioner, and Council Executive Board member. Last summer he led the Alpha Phi Omega National Jamboree Service Troop at Valley Forge.

Dr. Galt is an active member of Bethel Methodist Church, serving on its Board of Stewards. He belongs to Sertoma International, the Junior Chamber of Commerce, the United Fund, the American Humanics Society, and numerous medical societies, including the American Medical Association, the South Carolina Medical Association, and the American Society of Anesthesiology.

He is a graduate of Emory University, Atlanta, and holds his M.D. degree from the Medical College of South Carolina, Charleston. His social fraternity is Delta Tau Delta.

His family includes his charming wife, and daughter, Rosemary.

DENVER CONVENTION REPORT

Alpha Phi Omega's 40th Anniversary Convention, held at the Brown Palace Hotel, Denver, Colorado, December 27-29, 1964, brought together delegates from 163 chapters, assembled from all parts of the United States.

The 713 registered delegates participated ardently in the program, which featured three nationally known speakers, four effective Leadership Training sessions, a National Service Idea Exchange, and a productive business session.

Dr. Tom T. Galt of Spartanburg, South Carolina, was elected National President. Other officers chosen were E. Ross Forman, First Vice President; Dr. Glen T. Nygreen, Second Vice President; Hon. Mark O. Hatfield, Governor of Oregon, Third Vice President; and Manfred O. Awe, Jr., National Treasurer.

Newly elected to the National Executive Board were Ed Andrews, Lynchburg, Virginia; Dr. Lester G. Brailey, Kent State University; and General H. O. Paxson, Vanderbilt University.

The Convention reelected to the Board Frank G. Cuny, Irwin H. Gerst, Dean Lewis N. Jones, Dr. Delmer H. Wilson, and Rev. Frans A. Victorson. Dr. Wilson and Dean Arno Nowotny of Texas were reelected to the National Endowment Fund Committee. Joseph Scanlon continues as the National Executive of the Fraternity, but under the new designation of National Executive Director, a title change made by the Convention.

National Distinguished Service Awards, the highest honor Alpha Phi Omega can confer, were presented to George F. Cahill, Dr. Lawrence L. Hirsch, Dean Lewis N. Jones, and A. G. Spizzirri, all members of the National Executive Board.

Enthusiasm and interest were in evidence throughout the Convention, from the keynote speech by Hon. H. Roe Bartle, through the Monday luncheon address on "The Song of

America" by George M. Mardikian, to the closing address on "The Changing World Power Structure" by Edward Radenzel, Foreign Editor of the San Francisco Chronicle. The fine preparations by Program Chairman Gerald M. Plessner, and Arrangements Chairman, J. D. Armstrong, furnished effective leadership and guidance. Mrs. Thomas Pierce, Convention Parliamentarian, added her knowledge and charm to the election and legislative sessions.

Minneapolis was chosen as the site for the 1966 Convention over nine other cities seeking to host it.

Mrs. Violette Armstrong, who for sixteen years served as registrar for Alpha Phi Omega, retired on October 31. Her fine services were recognized at the Convention. Mr. Scanlon praised her work and presented a gift. A standing ovation was accorded her by the delegates.

Monday's events included the meeting of the Legislative and National Fraternity Committees. The main features of the day were the National Training Institute Sessions. The workshops on Membership, Administration, Program and Finance were conducted by carefully selected and experienced Fraternity leaders from all over the United States.

Dr. Tom T. Galt presided over the noon Leadership luncheon. The highlight of the luncheon was "Song of America," an inspiring address by Mr. George Mardikian, author and world traveler.

Gifts were presented to the Presidents of the host chapters in appreciation for their outstanding contributions to the Convention; to Gerald M. Plessner, Program Chairman; and to J. D. Armstrong, Arrangements Chairman. West Virginia Institute of Technology presented a beautiful silk screen crest to Joseph Scanlon for the National Service Headquarters. The Man-Mile Award was received by Mu Tau, West Virginia Institute of Technology.

A runner-up banner was awarded to Delta Omega, University of Houston.

The host chapters sponsored a Fellowship gathering on Sunday evening and a social get-together Monday evening. The Convention expressed its appreciation.

The Tuesday sessions featured the reports of the National Committees and the subsequent action on these reports. Minneapolis was selected as the 1966 Convention site, National Officers and Board Members were elected, and action was taken on the proposed amendments to the National Constitution and By-Laws.

The Resolutions and Appreciations Committee report was received and adopted. The appreciation of the Convention was extended to Paul Kuhn, Jr., Theta Mu, Nominating Committee Chairman; Chris Conklin, Mu Phi, Time and Place Committee Chairman; Dave Phillips, Zeta, Constitution and By-Laws Committee Chairman; and John O'Keefe, Alpha Eta, Resolutions and Appreciations Committee Chairman; and to the men who served on their Committees, for their fine reports.

The closing scholarly address was delivered by Edward Radenzel, Foreign Editor of the San Francisco Chronicle. At the banquet a telegram was read from Lyndon B. Johnson, President of

the United States, who congratulated Alpha Phi Omega on its 40th Anniversary and wished the Fraternity continued success. R. Sargent Shriver, Director of the Peace Corps, placed a telephone call to President Steig at the Tuesday banquet. Through an amplifier system, Mr. Shriver addressed the delegates on the importance of Alpha Phi Omega to the Peace Corps.

The National Executive Board, in accordance with the National Constitution and By-Laws, met immediately before and immediately after the Convention. President Steig presided at the December 27 meeting and President Galt at the December 29 session.

MEET YOUR NEW



Dr. Glen T. Nygreen

Dr. Glen T. Nygreen of Hunter College, New York City, is the new National Second Vice President. Dr. Nygreen, a long time supporter of Alpha Phi Omega, is Dean of Students and Professor of Sociology at Hunter.

One of the outstanding Deans of the nation, Dr. Nygreen is the President-Designate of the National Association of Student Personnel Administrators, for which he has served as Conference Chairman since 1959. Currently he is the Eminent Supreme Archon of Sigma Alpha Epsilon. A Navy veteran of World War II, he has been active in many phases of Scouting.

Dr. Nygreen has a splendid background in the fraternity, starting as an advisor to Gamma Alpha, University of Washington, in 1947. When he became Dean of Student Life at Kent State University, he took on the job of advisor to Epsilon Psi. He hosted the first National Planning Conference of the fraternity, held at Kent State in 1961. Dr. Nygreen has been on the National Executive Board since 1960. His performance in this capacity exemplifies his dedication to the principles of Leadership, Friendship, and Service.

Dr. Lester G. Brailey, Sectional Chairman for the state of Ohio, joins the National Executive Board for a six-year term. Dr. Brailey, Director of Placement at Kent State University, has been active in Alpha Phi Omega since 1944, when he became an advisor for Alpha Iota Chapter at Ohio State University. He has subsequently served as advisor for Eta Upsilon, Marshall College; Beta, University of Pittsburgh; and for Epsilon Psi, Kent State.

Dr. Brailey, an untiring worker for Alpha Phi Omega, has been instrumental in expanding Alpha Phi Omega in his section. In the past year he has installed Xi Upsilon, Mount Union College; Omicron Beta, Marietta College; and is preparing to present a charter to Denison University. He was instrumental in conducting the National Planning Conference held at Kent State in September of 1961. Dr. Brailey also organized a seminar to which representatives of colleges and universities without chapters of A Phi O were invited. Because of his able presentation of the purposes of the fraternity, five new chapters have joined our ranks, and several petitioning groups are preparing to affiliate. He played a key role in the 1964 National Convention, assisting with the finance workshop.

His enthusiasm is equaled only by his continuing interest in and support of Alpha Phi Omega.

NATIONAL LEADERS

Hon. Mark O. Hatfield, Governor of Oregon, will serve as the Third Vice President of the fraternity. A native Oregonian, Governor Hatfield is a charter member of Epsilon Kappa, Willamette University, where he later became Dean of Students.

The Governor has been a prominent figure in the Republican Party over the past several years. His first elected office was that of State Representative. From there he went on to become a State Senator, Secretary of State, and then Governor in 1958. The Governor had the honor of nominating Richard Nixon for President in 1960. In 1962, when he was re-elected Governor, Life Magazine selected him as one of the most important young men in the United States. At the 1964 Republican National Convention, Governor Hatfield served as the Convention Keynote.

Governor Hatfield and his wife, Antoinette, are the parents of two daughters and one son. The new Vice President considers it a distinct honor to be elected to this position and expresses his gratitude to the men of Alpha Phi Omega.

General H. O. Paxson, Advisory Chairman to Theta Mu Chapter, Vanderbilt University for the past four years, brings to the National Executive Board a colorful and exciting background. The General, a distinguished alumnus of West Point, retired as a Brigadier General after more than 30 years of military service. He is currently serving as the Director of Sponsored Research at Vanderbilt.

During World War II General Paxson served as a member of General Eisenhower's staff. His many honors include the Legion of Merit, Order of the British Empire, the French Medaille de Reconnaissance, the Order of the Crown from Italy, Poland's Order of the Crossed Swords, and a personal commendation from the Director of the FBI. He has been featured in Who's Who in America for the past 10 years.

General Paxson is an enthusiastic supporter of Alpha Phi Omega. He reorganized Theta Mu, installed Xi Psi Chapter at Western Kentucky State, and has been working to expand the fraternity in Western Tennessee and adjacent areas. The Boy Scouts of America conferred on him the Order of the Silver Beaver for distinguished service to boyhood. He has served Scouting in many capacities, acting as President of the Panama Canal Zone Council when he was Lieutenant Governor of the Canal Zone.

The National Executive Board welcomes this outstanding American.



Mr. Ed Andrews, Sectional Chairman for Virginia, North Carolina, and South Carolina, brings to the Board an excellent background in service. Mr. Andrews, a professional Scouter with the Piedmont Area Council, and his wife, Nancy, reside in Lynchburg, Virginia.

Mr. Andrews has assisted Alpha Phi Omega in many ways since he was President of Iota Rho Chapter at Florida State University. He has served as a Presidential Representative, Sectional Chairman, and National Convention Program Vice Chairman. His active interest in extension has generated many new and reorganized chapters. He was instrumental in reviving Theta, University of Virginia; Iota Rho, Florida State; Lambda Nu, Duke University; Mu Iota, Lynchburg College; and Mu Xi, High Point College. He has participated in the organization of Mu Omega, University of Tampa; Nu Rho, College of William and Mary; Nu Chi, Davidson; and Xi Chi, Greensboro College. Mr. Andrews is currently working with several petitioning groups in his section.

Mr. Andrews with his many experiences in Scouting and his dedication to Alpha Phi Omega, will be a valuable asset to the National Executive Board.




